Elizabeth-Triptychon (cut), from 1480, in the Staatlichen Kunsthalle in Karlsruhe

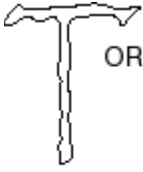
St. Elizabeth of Hungary, Patron of the SFO (1207-1231)

8th Centenary of her Birth

The daughter of the King of Hungary, Elizabeth chose a life of penance and asceticism. At age 14, Elizabeth married Louis of Thuringia, whom she deeply loved; she bore three children. Seeking to become one with the poor, she wore simple clothing. Daily she would take bread to hundreds of the poorest in the land. After six years of marriage, her husband died in the Crusades. Her husband’s family mistreated her, and threw her out of the palace. She was later reinstated by her husband’s allies. In 1228, Elizabeth joined the Secular Franciscan Order, and spent her remaining years caring for the poor in a hospital she founded. Her health declined, and she died before her 24th birthday. Her great popularity resulted in her canonization four years later.

My dear sister, Janet, minister:

My dear brothers and sisters:

May the Lord give you peace!

As you celebrate the 120 years of the existence of your local fraternity, it is my special pleasure to send you a message of fraternal affection, recognition and gratitude.

120 years! One hundred and twenty years of fidelity to your vocation, of self-giving, of experiences of fraternal life, of announcing and living the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. One hundred and twenty years of visions and hopes, and also, I imagine, of some frustrations.

At the same time that you are celebrating this joyful anniversary, we are also celebrating 800 years since the birth of our holy patron, St. Elizabeth of Hungary, and the entire Franciscan Family is preparing to celebrate the 800th anniversary of the beginnings of our charism – the conversion of St. Francis. These are happy coincidences that invite us to immerse ourselves deeply in the fundamentals of our spirituality.

This is a time to celebrate and also to reflect on the current condition of your fraternity and of the personal life of each one of you. After the example of St. Francis and St. Elizabeth, your reflections must flow from a faith perspective and from the teachings of Jesus. Be grateful to God for all the people with whom you actually come in contact: our brothers and sisters, the sick, seniors and young people, those who share with us their worries and confidences – to all of them we must offer living witness of Gospel life lived in fraternity. The encounter with these brothers and sisters shows us that, at the core of our humanity, what brings us peace, what gives us freedom, and what makes our lives coherent is the ability to trust in God's love and to know how to express God's love in concrete ways in our mission of love and compassion to others.

Look at St. Elizabeth – she shows us how to fulfill our vocation in an intentional, adult manner. She also teaches us today how to follow the life God invites us to lead, how to make God's plan our own, even when it does not correspond to our own plans. St. Elizabeth left us nothing in writing. Her personal life is her only testimony. Her life is easy to understand and admire, because from her earliest youth she adopted a life-giving lifestyle based on love:

- love of God;
- love of her spouse;
- love of her children;

– love of and service to the poorest of the poor and the handicapped;
– **Christian** love — compassionate, merciful love — that reached out to everyone and was understood by everyone. Saint Elizabeth demonstrated to history and to the world, that it is one’s personal holiness lived in simplicity that unites the saints to God.

The message of her life is very relevant in today’s world. Living the fullness of matrimony and accepting children lovingly and courageously is one of the most beautiful expressions of holiness, of an authentically Christian life.

Saint Elizabeth teaches us that in Christian marriage it is possible to achieve a communion of life comparable to the indivisible fusion of life that exists between Christ and his Church. Our Rule stresses the witness that married Secular Franciscans must give. The Rule reminds us that it is with and in our conjugal life that we respond to the universal call to holiness: for spouses, Christian marriage **is** the “way to holiness.”

Our Rule tells us that we must develop a full conjugal life – full of love and mutual self-giving, and that, because spouses’ paths to God are intertwined, they must share prayer (see art. 8), the spirit of poverty (art. 11), and purity of heart (art. 12), all of which, in their own time, must be expressed in charitable deeds in the church and in society. For the sake of educating others, now more than ever we need to give strong, unequivocal witness. The Secular Franciscan family must know how to **be** a reason for hope and how **to give** others reason for hope. The Secular Franciscan family affirms its claim as a school for humanity, a place for personal fulfillment, a moment in time for Christian mission.

Members of the Third Order of Saint Francis, there is an important challenge that lies before us. I invite our brothers and sisters to take full advantage of this time of grace by becoming more deeply acquainted with our patron (St. Elizabeth) so that we may better comprehend and put into practice our commitment to be a **prophetic presence** in the society of our day and age. It is now our turn to broadcast a new message, tearing down old, undesirable structures in society, in the Church and in our Order.

Yes, brothers and sisters, we need to be a prophetic presence even within our own Order. God continues to choose men and women today to speak to his people – even to ourselves. Prophets who call for renewal and change, lest we become complacent in our attitudes and in our actions. It is always possible to take one more step forward which undoes our immobility and shocks us out of our laziness and, at times, our cowardice. Prophets, like Elizabeth of Hungary, who do not pacify, but rather who irritatingly nudge our faith, our hope, our charity. Prophets who make us understand that we do not live to satisfy our personal ambitions, but to proclaim the kingdom – God’s reign. The methods and means are the same that Elizabeth used: faith, love, self-surrender, renunciation, compassion, conversion, respect, accepting diversity, fraternal warmth, and the fervent fulfilling of one’s own duties.

Congratulations, brothers and sisters! I ask the Lord to bless you and watch over you on your Franciscan journey in leading an authentically fraternal life.

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear brothers and sisters,

May our Lord's peace and all good be with you!

November conjures up images of saints, souls, **SFO Profession**, family, food, and **THANKSGIVING** – all signs of how good the Lord is and how God's love indeed lasts forever.

Psalm 118:1-4 (NAB)

Give thanks to the Lord, who is good, whose love endures forever.

Let the house of Israel say: God's love endures forever.

Let the house of Aaron say: God's love endures forever.

Let those who fear the Lord say: God's love endures forever.

When I had the privilege of assisting the terminally ill, I sometimes encountered people who seemed to be overcome by all the “losses” that accompany serious illnesses. A technique I learned and used for helping them cope often proved very effective. I asked them to start their day by writing down everything they considered a loss – whether physical, material, spiritual, or financial, etc. I would tell them to continue this until right before dinner and then to put that piece of paper away. Starting with dinner, they were asked to take a clean sheet of paper and write down all the things they felt they were still blessed with and **thankful** for, despite their sickness and pains. At the end of the day, they were to go to sleep with this paper close to them. This exercise, reminding them of all that they still had, lightened their burdens and brought them consolation and joy even in the midst of suffering! It reminds me of the attitude of our Seraphic Father Francis: to find **JOY** leading to **THANKSGIVING** even in the midst of suffering!

This month, at our Third Sunday Meeting (**November 18th with a Mass beginning at 1:30 PM**), our brother, **Chuck Sapien**, will be **professed**. Chuck is a true blessing to our fraternity! He has been a willing participant — a caring *brother* — in so many ways! I am hoping that all our brothers and sisters who are able will attend the Profession Mass and express to Chuck how thankful we are for him.

Our Fraternity has had a very busy series of events recently. I am thankful to all of you who made our 120th Jubilee; the *Solanus Casey – a Simple Man – Concert*; and the *Transitus* a true display of Franciscan fraternal love. Although the October 4th Mass in honor of St. Francis was not as well-attended, Capuchin Wally Balduck – one of our former Spiritual Assistants – gave an inspirational homily about why our “yoke is easy and our burden light.” Of course, it is because Jesus shares the yoke which he has custom made just for us. Diagnosis: Stage IV neuroblastoma

Since arriving at St. Jude in January 2004, Madelyn has had 13 different chemotherapy drugs, a tumor resection, a stem cell transplant and radiation, all of which seemed to stabilize the tumor growth. But in January 2007, a scan showed that the cancer had spread. Madelyn is currently being matched with a new treatment protocol.

Despite her relapse, Madelyn is a bright, inquisitive 5-year-old. She adores her older brother and her brand new baby sister, who she helped name. At St. Jude, she loves participating in arts and crafts and playing with the dogs who visit as part of the pet therapy program. These are the things that make her mother, Brandi, thankful that they came to St. Jude. And of the donors who help make all this possible, she said, “We’re overwhelmed with the love and support they give. We’re blessed not to have to pay for lodging, transportation or meal cards. It’s one less thing to worry about. Their help allows us to focus on the happy times.”

The meetings are held in the 2nd floor Conference Room of the Solanus Casey Center from 6:30 to about 9 PM. Executive sessions, which sometimes occur at the end of the regular council meeting, are closed sessions. Use the back door; however, there is no admittance after 6:30 PM.

EMB ANNUAL BRUNCH

IMPORTANT NOTICE

The licensing regulations of the State of Michigan which govern the kitchen and dining room of the Solanus Casey Center prohibit us from leaving any food behind after our meetings — even food intended for the poor or for those who may use the facility after us. Any food that people touch with their hands in the preparation phase – such as sandwiches – presents a serious public health concern. The dining facilities can only remain open if we fully comply with the State's regulations. We need to eliminate all such foods. Finger foods, such as chips, cheese and crackers, veggies, fruits and sweets, and bag lunches are okay. Nothing should be left in the kitchen or refrigerator. The Center is also prohibited from using the dishwasher since it is not licensed as a restaurant. Members are asked to claim their dishes after each meeting and wash them at home.
