MINISTER'S LETTER

Jesus Christ is risen! Jesus Christ is alive! Alleluia!

This is the day that the Lord has made: let us rejoice and be glad. Alleluia!

As I was praying about the message that I would share with you this month, I asked God to grant me wisdom and to provide me with the message that he would want me to share with you. I believe that the message I am to share with you is this: **Live the Resurrection.**

We can **Live the Resurrection** by taking time to stay connected to the Spirit of the living God, who is the resurrection and the life, the Source of all hope, joy and love, and who has promised to be with us until the end of time.

Since you became alive again, so to speak, when Christ arose from the dead, now set your sights on the rich treasures and joys of heaven where he sits beside God in the place of honor and power. Let heaven fill your thoughts; don't spend your time worrying about things of earth. You should have as little desire for this world as a dead person does. Your real life is in heaven with Christ and God. And when Christ who is our real life comes back again, you will shine with him and share in all his glories (Col 3:1-4).

We can **Live the Resurrection** by proclaiming to others that God loves us so much that he sent his Son, Jesus, to suffer and die for us so that we may have eternal life. As believers in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, we have the promise of eternal life. Death is not the end, but the beginning of eternal life. The sting of death and sin is gone through Christ's victorious death and resurrection.

But the fact is that Christ did actually rise from the dead, and has become the first of millions who will come back to life again some day. Death came into the world because of what one man [Adam] did, and it is because of what this other man (Christ) has done that now there is the resurrection from the dead. Everyone dies because all of us are related to Adam, being members of his sinful race, and wherever there is sin, death results. But all who are related to Christ will rise again. Each, however, in his own turn: Christ rose first; then when Christ comes back, all his people will become alive again (1 Cor 15:20-23).

We can **Live the Resurrection** by sharing both by our words and actions the message of hope, joy and love to all those in need. We are called by God to live the resurrection, to become a community of people fully alive in love. Even though we live in a world filled with darkness, death, sin, suffering, fear, worry and anxiety, we – believers in the Resurrection – are called to bring hope to the hopeless, to forgive each other, to work for justice, to comfort those who mourn, to love and serve each other, especially the poor of the world, to be living examples of the Good News to others.

All the believers were of one heart and one mind, and no one felt that what he owned was his own; everyone was sharing. And the apostles preached powerful sermons about the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and there was warm fellowship among all the believers, and no poverty, for all who owned land or houses sold them and brought the money to the apostles to give to others in need (Act 4: 32-35).

And so I am giving a new commandment to you now – love each other just as much as I have loved you (Jn 13:34).

May our risen Lord fill your heart with hope, joy and love. I wish you and your families a joyous and blessed Easter. **Live the Resurrection!**

Congratulations to **Anna Tyler** on receiving the 2010 Urban Parish Spirit Award. The March 5th edition of *The Michigan Catholic* (p. 3) had this to say about our Anna: "Shirley Partida and Anna Tyler are examples of the kind of person who makes a difference in a parish, whose participation goes beyond just regular attendance...[they] are among 21 recipients of this year's Urban Parish Spirit Award, all of whom were recognized at a Feb. 10 ceremony at Sacred Heart Church, Detroit. The awards are co-sponsored by the archdiocesan Office for Black Catholic Ministries and the Urban Parish Coalition of

the Detroit Catholic Pastoral Alliance. ...Capuchin Fr. Raymond Stadmeyer, pastor of St. Charles Borromeo Parish, said Tyler is a 'woman of prayer and deep faith, a very humble person.' Noting that Tyler is one of the parish's 'prayer warriors,' he continued, 'People will go to her when they're in trouble and ask her to pray for them. She's a retired psychiatric nurse, and brings that kind of calmness to situations.' "And although disabled by an old back injury, Tyler helps many other parishioners by driving them to doctors' appointments and other places. 'She'll drive anybody anywhere. Her car becomes a vehicle for ministry,' Fr. Stadmeyer says. Tyler's connection to the parish goes back a long way, having graduated from the parish's high school in 1962. She lived in other parts of the country during some of the intervening years, but returned to St. Charles when she moved back to Detroit. She serves on the parish council and Renaissance Vicariate council, and was a member of the Archdiocesan Pastoral Council. 'I do what I can,' she says. Tyler is also involved with the parish's ministry to area nursing homes and group home residents. And she is a member of the Secular Franciscans. Although the back injury she has had since the 1990s still gives her trouble and causes her to need a cane or walker to get around, she says she doesn't mind too much: 'It allows me to share in some limited degree in Jesus' suffering, and it helps other people, too – by allowing them to fuss over me.'" What a wonderful witness to Gospel faith!

successful strategies from his own experiences with the First Order. He focused his remarks on a process known as Appreciative Inquiry which offers an alternative to the human tendency to focus on problems. Appreciative Inquiry “flips the switch” and focuses on the strengths and the best in people and groups to build a new reality.

Developed in the 1980s by David Cooperrider, “AI” [i.e., Appreciative Inquiry] is based on the assumption that every organization has something that works right—things that give life when it is most alive, effective, successful. AI begins by identifying what is positive and connecting to it in ways that heighten energy and vision for change. The process itself includes four phases: (1) the Discovery phase which brings to light the “best of what is” and “what has been;” (2) the Dream phase which explores “what might be;” (3) the Design phase which involves making choices about “what should be” – a conscious re-creation or transformation, to have the organization become more fully aligned with its positive past (Discovery) and highest potential (Dream); and lastly, (4) the Destiny phase that focuses on “what will be,” designed to elicit personal and organizational commitments and paths forward. Now that we have a little background to the process, we hope to re-visit Appreciative Inquiry in a more specific way related to our SFO fraternity. By building on the positive strengths – moving from strength to strength – we have a life-giving model which energizes and encourages dreaming and the achieving of positive goals. It was an exciting experience to share all the good in our members and fraternity.

Through the kindness of **Gina Rizzo**, **Natalie Grabowski** was able to join us on Sunday. Natalie is a permanently excused member, but hopes to be back with us whenever she can get a ride. New faces intermingled with more familiar smiles. Xavier and Lettie, a brother and sister who joined us last month, returned and plan to join the Inquirers Class in April.

St. Dominic & St. Francis

In the summer of 1215, St. Francis with a small group of friars were in Rome seeking approbation for his Rule. One night during his stay while Francis was praying, he saw our Lord prepared to bring judgment on the world. The Blessed Virgin Mary was interceding on behalf of humankind. For this purpose, she presented two men who would labor for the conversion of the world. Francis recognized himself as one of these apostles. He did not recognize the other one, however.

The following day, he was in one of the churches of Rome when suddenly an unknown person came up to him, embraced him, and said: "You are my companion, we will work together, supporting one another toward the same end, and no one will prevail against us." Francis recognized him as the other man in the vision. It was St. Dominic, who had also received a similar vision. When he saw Francis in that church, he immediately went to greet him, inspired by the Holy Spirit.

According to one legend, they exchanged their belts – one of rope, the other of leather – as a sign of their mutual affection. Because they were founded within a few years of each other and with a similar zeal for apostolic poverty, the Dominicans and the Franciscans regard each other as true brothers in religion. Members of both orders refer to the two founder-saints as "Holy Father." As a further expression of their spiritual affinity, in many places it has become customary for a Dominican to preach at Franciscan celebrations on St. Francis' feast day (October 4), and alternately for a Franciscan to preach at Dominican celebrations on St. Dominic's feast day (August 8). This great spiritual friendship is imaged even in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. Colossal statues of St. Francis and St. Dominic flank the Altar of the Chair in the apse of the basilica.

Emma Ivie
4 years old
Neuroblastoma



Emma loved to ride her bike and play with her little sister Abby. But in spring 2008, she stopped wanting to ride her bike or play. At first, her doctor thought she had a virus. But then her parents noticed that Emma's eyelids turned yellow and black shadows appeared under her eyes. Soon, Emma stopped walking because it hurt. With growing alarm, her parents took her to the local children's hospital, where doctors did blood work. When the results came in, Emma was sent immediately to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Doctors at St. Jude ran more tests. The results were devastating: little Emma suffered from neuroblastoma, a common solid tumor of childhood. Her parents were in shock. Emma's parents found comfort and help at St. Jude. Emma's father was attending optometry school, so the family was living on a student budget and had two small children to care for. But St. Jude is the only pediatric cancer research center where families never pay for treatment not covered by insurance. With the burden of medical bills lifted, Emma's parents could focus on taking care of their daughter.

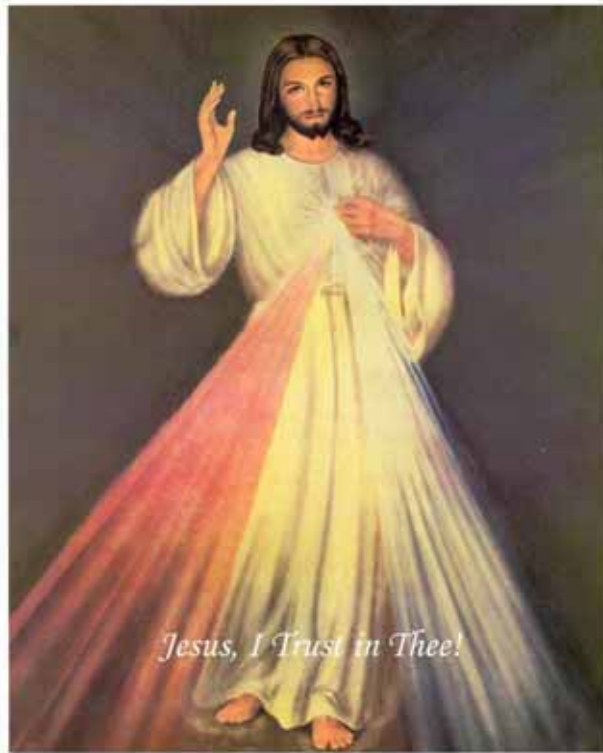
