Our Third Sunday gathering was fantastic! It was a follow-up to the presentation last month by Capuchin **Fr. John Celichowski** on Appreciative Inquiry. The meeting began with our Rule Reflection led by **Bev Sopian**. Much of the group reflections centered on the divine seed being present in everyone.

Next, Br. Pat led us in an experience of the first phase of the process of Appreciative Inquiry. We divided ourselves into groups of four people per table, with married couples sitting apart and those in initial formation being asked to sit among the professed members. The focus of the sharing was the question: “**What was your best experience as a Secular Franciscan thus far?**”

Since this was a sharing rather than a discussion, people were asked to share deeply their experiences and what the events meant to them and to really listen to the stories of the others at their table. At the end of the sharing, each table was asked to reflect on any common threads there might have been in their experiences, and to share the common threads with the entire group.

There were many, many magnificent things shared. I just wish that I could have been at each table to hear the experiences and stories. It was only then that Br. Pat informed us that we had experienced the first phase of the Appreciative Inquiry process. I could identify with Br. Pat when he said that he was unable to recall just a

single event of “the best experience of being a Franciscan.” He recalled participating in a Peace Walk from the Porziuncola to the Basilica of St. Francis that drew countless Franciscans of all denominations, both religious and secular, and how he felt like he truly was part of some force for good reaching to the far corners of the earth. He recalled the friars gathering around the bedside of **Fr. Jogues** (and other brothers) as he lay dying, a clear sign of “see how they love one another”. He recalled a group of friars going to a village decimated by an earthquake, pitching tents there among the grief-stricken to share their sorrow and to bring them consolation in their heartache, etc.

Everyone was enthusiastic after the experience, and Br. Pat explained that the point of the process is to go from strength to strength, and to build on the positive. What our members experienced in going through this process was very typical: a sense of pride in being a Secular Franciscan and member of our Fraternity, gratitude, excitement, blessing, in short — appreciation. At the end, the fraternity decided to continue with the Applicative Inquiry process at our next (June) meeting.



Our minister **Maryann Kummer** (*above*) then reminded everyone that because Fathers Day falls on the Third Sunday, our Fraternity Gathering will be held on the second Sunday, June 13<sup>th</sup>. Besides thanking everyone who brought goodies for our gathering as well as those who donated towels for the Towel Drive, Maryann also underscored how proud she is of our Fraternity, and how privileged she feels to be our minister.

**Aubrey  
10 years old  
acute lymphoblastic leukemia**

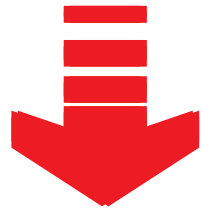
During a family outing to a restaurant, Aubrey’s step-grandfather mentioned that Aubrey looked pale. It being winter, her mom, Amy, thought that was normal for the season. But when Aubrey’s grandmother remarked on her pallor the next day, Amy decided to take her to the pediatrician to check for anemia. Five hours after that visit, Aubrey’s doctor pulled into the driveway of the family home. The doctor wanted to be there in person to deliver the frightening news. “I’m so sorry,” the pediatrician told Amy, “but Aubrey has leukemia.” “I felt numb,” said Amy. “I know I must have been in shock because I was shaking.” Amy’s friend—a nurse—was there that night, and she urged the family to take Aubrey to St. Jude Children’s Research Hospital. Amy obtained the referral, loaded her children into the car, and drove through the night. They drove through an ice storm and arrived in Memphis at 4 a.m. Her husband, who had been away on a trip, met them at the hospital.

Aubrey was placed on an intense chemotherapy protocol to rid her body of the cancer. “The medical team at St. Jude makes the best decisions for her,” said Amy. “I feel comfortable and confident that Aubrey is getting the best care. No matter what happens, they know what to do.”

Aubrey is an energetic kid who loves to play, draw and sing at the top of her lungs. She loves her doctor and nurses and says she wants to be a nurse when she grows up. “We had such a normal life before,” said Amy. “Good friends, good grades, safe community. We were blessed. And this may sound strange, but I still think we’re blessed. This situation woke us up to realities that many families face. I see people differently now. I have more compassion, and Aubrey does too.”

# Rule Reflection for June

## SFO Rule, Art. 14; SFO Constitutions, Art. 20

### SFO Rule, Art. 14

Secular Franciscans, together with all people of good will, are called to build a more fraternal and evangelical world so that the kingdom of God may be brought about more effectively. Mindful that anyone “who follows Christ, the perfect man, becomes more of a man himself,” let them exercise their responsibilities competently in the Christian spirit of service.

### SFO Constitutions, Article 20

1. *Rule 14* Secular Franciscans, committed by their vocation to build the Kingdom of God in temporal situations and activities, live their membership both in the Church and in society as an inseparable reality.
2. As the primary and fundamental contribution to building a more just and fraternal world, they should commit themselves both to the generous fulfillment of the duties proper to their occupation and to the professional training that pertains to it. With the same spirit of service, they should assume their social and civil responsibilities.

### Questions for Table Discussion:

1. Our “secularity” [*Secular* Franciscans] means that we exercise active participation in the events and direction of society, and that we *do* something [more than just pray] to help redeem the world. As Christ gave himself to save the world, so Secular Franciscans are called to be a force for good in our world. What are you doing or could you do in this regard?

## Celebrating Hugh Montpetit



Hugh was born on June 4, 1930 to Hector and Aimee Montpetit of Québec, Canada. His father was the first in their family to move from Québec to the Detroit area and many of their family members followed soon afterwards. Hugh was born at home on Baldwin Avenue in Detroit. His sister, Carmen, age 85, is still very active. His older brother, Alfred, went to the seminary but left to join the Air Force during World War II. Alfred was shot down over Germany at the age of 19 and is buried in France. Hugh's younger sister, Jeanne, died of cancer at age 55.

Hugh attended St. Catherine School until the 7<sup>th</sup> Grade and then attended Assumption College High School in Windsor, Ontario, graduating in 1948. He also took real estate classes through the University of Michigan and continues to maintain his real estate license. He was a journeyman stereotyper like his father. When his trade was being phased out, he transferred to the Advertising Department of the *Detroit Free Press*, and operated as an account executive until his retirement in 1989.

Hugh met **Mary Ann McDonald** at the CYO Bowling Alley with the Junior Third Order in 1950. The Juniors were a very lively group involved in many spiritual and social activities. Hugh was professed as a Secular Franciscan in 1953. He and Mary Ann were married in June of 1955 at St. Ambrose Catholic Church. They have been blessed with four children and 12 grandchildren.

In the Intermediate Fraternity, Hugh served as Novice Master. For a number of years during the time of Fr. Cyril Langheim, Mary Ann and Hugh were workshop leaders. Hugh acted in the Passion Play under Fr. Lawrence Merten and Mary Ann was in the chorus. They have photos from these events and lots of good memories. Another memorable activity was canvassing the neighborhood around the Monastery for Bible Vacation School. At one point, Hugh drove a van to the Eastern Market to pick up produce and chickens for the Soup Kitchen on a regular basis.

Hugh and Mary Ann are parishioners of Our Lady Star of the Sea Catholic Church. Hugh serves as a lector at the church. Mary Ann and Hugh are currently taking a Bible Study course in their parish which they enjoy very much.

Hugh's hobbies include photography, fixing things around the house and traveling. He is also very interested in protecting the environment in various ways. Hugh has always been happy to be a follower of St. Francis. He likes to pray a lot, be happy and enjoy God's many gifts.

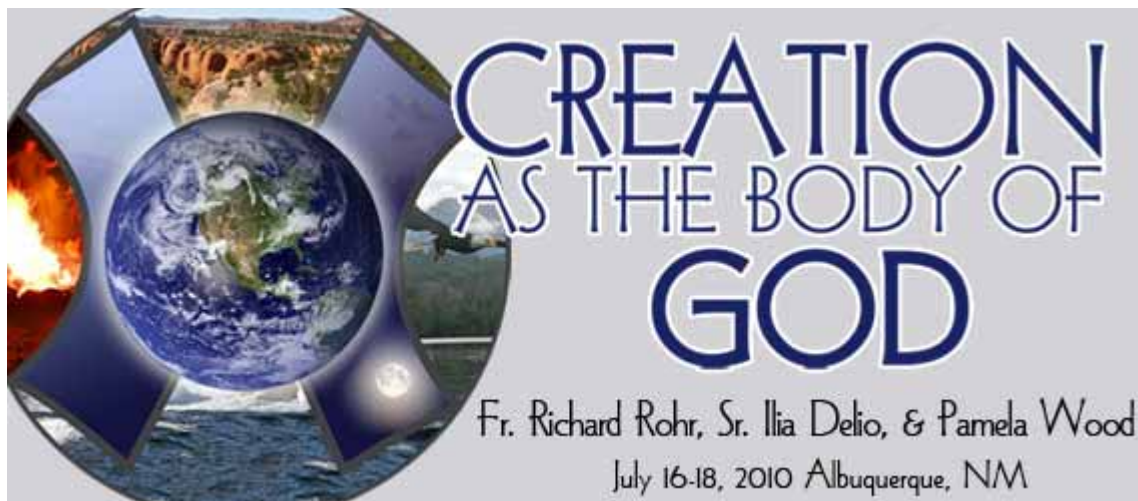
