# Celebrating Loretta and Norbert Chmielarczyk

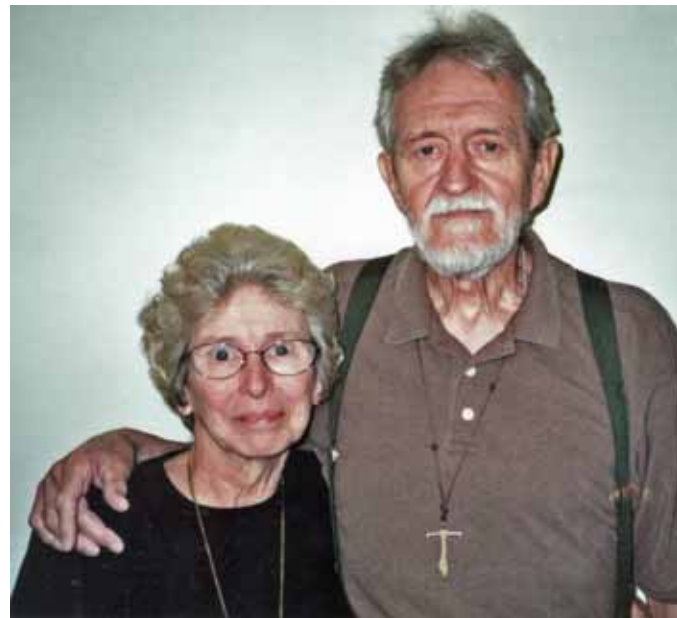

Norbert attended Our Lady Help of Christians Grade School. He spent two years at St. Stanislaus High School in Detroit, and was graduated from Warren High School. Loretta attended and graduated from St. Stanislaus Grade and High Schools.

For 41 years Norbert worked at Western Electric (now AT&T) as an installer. Before getting married, Loretta worked for Michigan Bell for two years.

Loretta and Norbert met through mutual friends and dated for four years. Norbert served in the U.S. Army stateside for three years during the Korean Era. They were married at St. Stanislaus Catholic Church on August 25, 1956. They have been blessed with eight children (four boys and four girls). One of their sons died when he was 15 months old. They are the proud grandparents of 16 grandchildren. Loretta and Norbert were introduced to the Secular Franciscan way of life at the home of **John and Marie Amore**. They were members of the last group professed by John Amore, fraternity minister, at St. Bonaventure in 1986.



Norbert has served as a Religious Emblem Councilor for the CYO Catholic Committee on Scouting for 29 years. He has also served as a volunteer at the Capuchin Soup Kitchen on Tuesdays and Thursdays since 1994. He has been involved with the Boy Scouts of America for 33 years. Both Loretta and Norbert serve as Eucharistic Ministers, assist with funeral ministries, and work on their annual festival at their parish, St. Louise de Marillac Church. Norbert has volunteered as a night supervisor for the homeless at his parish. Loretta has served as the Eucharistic Mission Band Custodian and Board Member for 24 years. Norbert is a military history buff, while, in her free time, Loretta enjoys gardening or as she calls it “playing in the dirt”, crocheting, reading and doing crossword puzzles.

# Rule Reflection for October

## SFO Rule, Art. 17; SFO Constitutions, Art. 24

### SFO Rule, Chapter II, Article 17

In their family they should cultivate the Franciscan spirit of peace, fidelity, and respect for life, striving to make of it a sign of a world already renewed in Christ.

By living the grace of matrimony, husbands and wives in particular should bear witness in the world to the love of Christ for his Church. They should joyfully accompany their children on their human and spiritual journey by providing a simple and open Christian education and being attentive to the vocation of each child.

### SFO Constitutions, Article 24

#### In the Family

1. *Rule 17* Secular Franciscans should consider their own family to be the first place in which to live their Christian commitment and Franciscan vocation. They should make space within it for prayer, for the Word of God, and for Christian catechesis. They should concern themselves with respect for all life in every situation from conception until death.

2. Married couples find in the Rule of the SFO an effective aid in their own journey of Christian life, aware that, in the sacrament of matrimony, their love shares in the love that Christ has for his Church. The way spouses love each other and affirm the value of fidelity is a profound witness for their own family, the Church, and the world.

#### In the fraternity:

- the spirituality of the family and of marriage and the Christian attitude towards family problems should be a theme for dialogue and for the sharing of experiences;
- they should share the important moments of the family life of their Franciscan brothers and sisters and they should give fraternal attention to those - single, widows, single parents, separated, divorced - who are living difficult situations;
- *Rule 19* they should create conditions suitable for dialogue between generations;
- the formation of groups of married couples and of family groups should be fostered.

3. The brothers and sisters should collaborate with the efforts undertaken in the Church and in society to affirm both the value of fidelity and respect for life and to provide answers to the social problems of the family.

**Personal Reflection:** Whether or not our family members share our Franciscan vocation, our natural family is the first place where we seek to live out our Franciscan calling and values. How are you doing this?

**Shared Reflection:** How are you concretely witnessing to an unconditional respect for all life, fidelity and integrity, especially within your family?

### **Nathan** 1 year old



When Nathan's mom couldn't seem to get a picture of her baby without capturing a glint of white in his left eye, she thought her camera was malfunctioning. She decided to show one of the photographs to his pediatrician. The doctor took one look at the photograph, and his face turned serious. He recommended she take Nathan to specialists right away. At the local hospital, the diagnosis was made: Nathan had bilateral retinoblastoma, a form of eye cancer. Tumors were present in both of Nathan's eyes, and he would need further care. Crushed, Nathan's parents asked the doctor where they should turn for their son's treatment. The doctor was quick to recommend St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

At St. Jude, Nathan received a total of 11 rounds of chemotherapy over the course of eight months. He also had laser treatments when, during treatment, his tumors started to grow back. In spring 2009, Nathan completed treatment. He returns to St. Jude for regular checkups.

Nathan's mom appreciates the family-centered care offered at St. Jude. When Nathan's older brothers visited St. Jude, Child Life Specialists were on hand to answer questions that they had about Nathan's treatment. "When your child has cancer, there are so many needs you have that aren't medical, and St. Jude meets all those needs."

Nathan is an energetic boy who loves running after his brothers and playing outside. "Cancer has not slowed him down," his mom said.

# THE MEANING OF FRATERNITY

I recently read some reflections of the martyred Catholic Archbishop, Oscar Romero. In 1978 he was reflecting on the meaning of the Christian community. As I read his reflections, I couldn't help but think how apropos his reflections are for us who follow Christ in the footsteps of St. Francis of Assisi. Only when we understand and appreciate what the Fraternity is meant to be can we understand and appreciate the duties and obligations toward the Fraternity which we took upon ourselves at the time of Profession.

Franciscans are never isolated individuals. Whether members of the First, Second or Third Order, religious or secular, we form part of a Fraternity — a Gospel Fraternity. Being a Gospel Fraternity means that our SFO community is evangelized in order to evangelize. In Abp. Romero's words: A light is lit in order to give light. A candle is not lit to be put under a bushel, said Christ. It is lit and put up high in order to give light. That is what a true community is like.

**A community is a group of men and women who have found the truth in Christ and in his gospel, and who follow the truth and join together to follow it more strongly.** They are there for each other.

**"It is not just an individual conversion, but a community conversion. It is a family that believes, a group that accepts God. In the group, each one finds that the brother or sister is a source of strength and that in moments of weakness they help one another and, by loving one another and believing, they give light and example."**

Therefore, one does not fulfill the obligations of our Profession by simply attending meetings (much less by not attending them!). The only way we can be a source of strength and a help to one another is if we fully participate in the life of our Fraternity, including our gatherings.

**"The preacher no longer needs to preach, for there are Christians who preach by their own lives. ...Each of you ... must become a microphone, a radio station, a loudspeaker, not to talk, but to call for faith."**

— Archbishop Oscar Romero, October 29, 1978
