On August 11, we will celebrate the feast of St. Clare of Assisi, the co-founder of the Franciscan Movement and the mother of the nuns of the Second Order (Poor Clares).

St. Clare was born in Assisi in 1193, the eldest daughter of noble parents. As the daughter of wealthy parents, Clare was educated in reading and writing. When Clare heard Francis preach at the Church of San Giorgio, she felt something stir within her and vowed to live the Gospel message in a radical way. At age 18, Clare renounced her nobility and wealth to live poorly and humbly, adopting the way of life proposed by Francis of Assisi. Among Clare's many virtues were compassion, tenderness, love for the poor, deep devotion to the Eucharist, her total surrender to God and trust in Divine Providence.

Pope John Paul II said of St. Clare: “her whole life was a Eucharist because...from her cloister she raised up a continual ‘thanksgiving’ to God in her prayer, praise, supplication, intercession, weeping, offering and sacrifice. She accepted everything from the Father in union with the infinite ‘thanks’ of the only begotten Son.”

St. Clare and her sisters owned nothing in this world and depended entirely on God's providence and the generosity of others to provide for their needs. Unlike the friars who traveled around the country to preach the Gospel, the Poor Clares lived in a secluded monastery and dedicated their lives to prayer.

St. Clare teaches us the importance of making time in our busy lives to sit quietly to gaze upon God. As Secular Franciscans, our vocation calls us to an active life in the world, but we also need time to just be with the Lord. All of us are very busy and finding time to sit quietly requires some rearranging of our daily schedule to make time for the One who is most important. Perhaps a few easy ways to achieve this is to arrive at your parish church 15 minutes before Mass begins or stay 15 minutes after just to sit quietly in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, or to attend Eucharistic Adoration at your local parish, or to sit quietly and gaze upon a crucifix in your own home.

St. Clare gives us an appreciation for the value of contemplation in our lives, to find time to rest in God. As Secular Franciscans, we are called not just to know the Gospel message but to reflect on its meaning and to live the Gospel message in our daily lives.

St. Clare teaches us that contemplation of God and his Word are transforming. Spending time in prayer is not enough, prayer must have an effect on how we live and interact with one another in our daily lives. As we spend more time in contemplation and reflection, allowing the Word of God to dwell in our hearts, the more our thoughts and actions will be transformed into the likeness of Christ. The more we experience Christ's peace, joy, love, forgiveness

and mercy, the more we will share and show that peace, joy, love, mercy and forgiveness with others.

St. Clare of Assisi, humble servant of Christ, pray for us. St. Clare of Assisi, brilliant light of holiness, pray for us. St. Clare of Assisi, model of Franciscan Gospel living, pray for us.

Remember to pray daily for vocations to the Secular Franciscan Order. Looking forward to seeing you at the fraternity gathering on Sunday, August 20.

**EMMA
4 YEARS OLD**

Two-year-old Emma underwent surgery and chemotherapy for a tumor, and needed radiation. Her parents were concerned about the effects of the radiation. They asked for a referral to St. Jude's which reduces the risks through the use of focalized radiation. At St. Jude, Emma underwent surgery to remove the rest of the tumor, when doctors discovered that the tumor was actually a glioblastoma. Emma underwent six weeks of focalized radiation and is currently receiving chemotherapy. She visits St. Jude every two weeks for intravenous chemotherapy and also takes oral chemotherapy at home.

“To be able to come here and not have a worry about whether you can afford it, or where you’re going to stay, or how you’re going to eat. It’s amazing,” said Emma’s mother. “Coming to St. Jude, Emma just feels so comfortable. She has no fear here. She loves it.” Emma is a sweet-natured girl who loves to play with her baby dolls, brothers and little cousins.

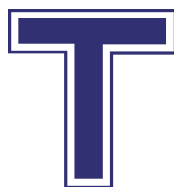
