

Join us for the celebration of the Feast of Blessed Solanus Casey at St. Bonaventure Chapel with Masses at 9:00 a.m., 12:00 noon, and 4:00 p.m. Feast Day celebrants TBA.

August 2: Our Lady of the Angels of Porziuncola and its associated indulgence is a way to focus on the importance of Mary and the Franciscan tradition in the Church. In 1216, at the request of St. Francis, the Pope granted special privilege (plenary indulgence – a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins) to all those who would visit the little chapel.

Although limited to noon on August 1st to midnight on August 2nd, the privilege continues to be granted to this day; not only to those who visit the Portiuncula, but to anyone who visits any church where the friars live and minister. To receive this privilege (for yourself or for someone else – living or deceased), in addition to the visit, one must receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation within several weeks of the feast, go to Mass and receive the Eucharist, recite the Our Father and Apostles Creed, and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. I will be attending the 20th Quinquennial in Phoenix, Arizona from August 3 -7 and the Divine Mercy Region Minister Meeting in DeWitt from August 12-14. Eucharistic Revival:

The celebration of the Eucharistic Revival on a national level launched on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Jesus—Corpus Christi—June 19, 2022. We begin at an Archdiocesan level which will give an example for and lead to every Family of Parishes participating in opportunities to encounter Jesus in the Most Holy Eucharist.

The parish (Family of Parishes) Year of Eucharistic Revival will begin on June 11, 2023 and continue through July 17, 2024.

The Eucharistic Revival will lead to a **National Eucharistic Congress** which will be July 17 - 21, 2024 in Indianapolis, Indiana and July 17, 2024 — Pentecost 2025 will be a Year of Going out on Mission.

Final thoughts

A landmark decision was made by the United States Supreme Court on June 24, 2022 with the overturning of Roe v Wade. This decision moves the abortion debate to the states and our elected representatives. This allows both sides of the abortion issue to properly debate and create laws regulating abortion just like other health and welfare laws. "These laws would include respect for and preservation of prenatal life at all stages of development; the protection of maternal health and safety; the elimination of particularly gruesome or barbaric medical procedures; the preservation of the integrity of the medical profession; the mitigation of fetal pain; and the prevention of discrimination on the basis of race, sex or disability," explained in the decision.

From a moral perspective the CCC 2271 teaches "Since the first century the Church has affirmed the moral evil of every procured abortion. This teaching has not changed and remains unchangeable. Direct abortion, that is to say, abortion willed either as an end or a means, is gravely contrary to the moral law: You shall not kill the embryo by abortion and shall not cause the newborn to perish. God, the Lord of life has entrusted to men the noble mission of safeguarding life, and men must carry it out in a manner worthy of themselves. Life must be protected with the utmost care from the moment of conception: abortion and infanticide are abominable crimes."

In the scientific community it is an overwhelming consensus that life begins at conception. It is at that moment the unborn are fully living, genetically unique members of the species Homo sapiens. They might be smaller and less developed, but still human beings. I don't think the question is when is something alive? But more like when do you think the baby's life begins to matter? This is not a scientific question. It really is a choice. Which Homo sapiens deserve to live? Who will decide? Where do you stand?

This continues to be a highly debated issue in the public square. I encourage you to take the issue to prayer and seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Study the issue and the Church teachings. Let's do all we can to promote the health and well-being of both the mother and baby. The family is the gift of a healthy society. Jesus was born into a family – the Holy Family. Our model of compassionate and unconditional love.

What Makes Secular Franciscans Different from Other Catholics?

This week we look at Our Franciscan Spirituality

Our Franciscan Spirituality—comes from the spirituality of our founder, St. Francis of Assisi. Franciscan spirituality is incarnational, intensely Eucharistic, and penitential. We often hear the words "crib, cross, and Eucharist" when learning about St. Francis's spirituality. Francis was in awe of the Incarnation, the Kénosis (self-emptying) shown by God in becoming one of us. His devotion to the Incarnation is most obvious in the recreation at Greccio of the birth of Christ. But it goes much deeper. Francis wanted to imitate Jesus perfectly in all things so that he too would become a son of the Father, so much so that he became known as the "mirror of Christ."

St. Francis's constant contemplation of the cross is part of his devotion to the Incarnation. Here is God, who was not only born in a lowly manger, but God who was willing to die the worst, most humiliating death possible so that we could spend eternity with him. In order to imitate this death to self, Francis knew that penance and daily conversion (metanoia) were the only way to the Father. As he prayed on Mount La Verna, he asked two things: one, to let him experience the suffering Christ endured on the Holy Cross and two, for him to experience the love in which He did it. Francis's prayer was granted as he was imprinted with the wounds of Christ in the Stigmata.

And then, the Eucharist. Jesus is physically present with us every day under the appearances of bread and wine. We hear directly from Francis in the First Letter to the Custodians, "With all that is in me and more I beg you that, when it is fitting and you judge it expedient, you humbly beg the clergy to revere above all else the most holy Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ and His holy names and the written words that sanctify His Body. 3They should hold as precious the chalices, corporals, appointments of the altar, and everything that pertains to the sacrifice. 4If the most holy Body of the Lord is very poorly reserved in any place, let It be placed and locked up in a precious place according to the command of the Church. Let It be carried about with great reverence and administered to others with discernment."

All of this is wrapped in Sacred Scripture. Francis gives us our spiritual focus. He lived by the words of the Gospel, and we imitate him in our reading and praying of and living out the gospel.

Rule Article 4. "The rule and life of the Secular Franciscans is this: to observe the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by following the example of Saint Francis of Assisi, who made Christ the inspiration and the center of his life with God and people6. Christ, the gift of the Father's love, is the way to him, the truth into which the Holy Spirit leads us, and the life which he has come to give abundantly7.

Secular Franciscans should devote themselves especially to careful reading of the gospel, going from gospel to life and life to the gospel8."

Article 5. "Secular Franciscans, therefore, should seek to encounter the living and active person of Christ in their brothers and sisters, in Sacred Scripture, in the Church, and in liturgical activity. The faith of Saint Francis, who often said "I see nothing bodily of the Most High Son of God in this world except his most holy body and blood"9, should be the inspiration and pattern of their eucharistic life."

Article 8. "As Jesus was the true worshipper of the Father, so let prayer and contemplation be the soul of all they are and do14. Let them participate in the sacramental life of the Church, above all the Eucharist. Let them join in liturgical prayer in one of the forms proposed by the Church, reliving the mysteries of the life of Christ."

From Santos Alvarez:

Since childhood, I have wanted to be a missionary. I dreamed of going throughout the world spreading God's message of love, truth, hope and joy. I am from Mexico, and while I was there, I went to a private school, run by nuns who help the most needy orphans. There I had a direct encounter with God, and it was there that I understood how much I loved singing, playing music and teaching others about God's word. Later on, when I left that middle school, I went back to my town where my family was, and there I started a children's choir. Meanwhile, I also joined more choirs and missionary church groups.

I don't know why, but while in Mexico, I had always been interested in learning English. I did not realize it was God's plan that later I would emigrate to the USA.

I continue to serve in the Church here in the US. About 8 years ago, I felt that God wanted me to form a children's choir here at St Clement of Rome Catholic Church in Romeo. So I spoke with Madre Valeria (Sister Valerie Knoche). She spoke to the pastor, Fr Stephen Reckker, got his permission, and now we have a choir called La Fuerza Del Amor (The Power of Love), which includes children that are just learning to sing and play an instrument. Later, I thought about taking our music beyond the walls of St Clement, evangelizing those who are not coming and attending church events. So, I selected a smaller group of passionate, talented people, with more knowledge about music, to play and sing wherever we are invited. This smaller group is called Amoris Lingua (The Language of Love). The goal is simple: to bring souls to God.

God has given me many gifts and has been so good to me, as he has been to all of his children, each in his own special way. I continue to use those gifts to the best of my ability to spread his message of love, truth, hope and joy.

means "little portion" in Italian.

the Order of the Friars Minor (1209).
The Chapel is situated inside the
Basilica of Saint Mary of the Angels.
