November is National Black Catholic History Month celebrating the long history and proud heritage of Black Catholics. Following is an excerpt from "Created in Christ" by Sophia Press regarding slavery and the writings of the early Church Fathers.

Christianity recognizes all people share an equal dignity as creatures made in the image of God. The early Christians might have owned slaves or been enslaved, but the Church did not discriminate based on social condition. Slaves could marry, be ordained, and be buried in the same cemetery as free people. In its sacramental life, the Church planted a seed by simply ignoring worldly distinctions between slaves and slave owners. The Church Fathers even addressed slavery in their writings:

Church Father Lactantius explained in "Divine Institutes" (A.D. 303) there were no natural slaves or slave owners in Christ: "God who produces and gives breath to men, willed that all should be equal...He promised immortality to all; no one is cut off from His heavenly benefits...In his sight no one is a slave, no one a master; for if we have all the same Father, by an equal right we are all children."

St. Basil declared in "On the Holy Spirit" (A.D. 364) that slavery was unnatural: "Among men no one is a slave by nature. For men are either brought under a yoke of slavery by conquest, as when prisoners are taken in war; or they are enslaved on account of poverty, as the Egyptians were oppressed by Pharaoh."

St. Augustine saw slavery as part of our fallen condition. He wrote in "City of God" (A.D. 426): "we do not find the word 'slave' in any part of Scripture until righteous Noah branded the sin of his son with this name. It is a name, therefore, introduced by sin and not by nature."

Let's remember the teachings of our Church Fathers and like them plant the seeds of love and dignity to everyone we meet.

Lastly, I want to thank everyone that participated in the National Fraternity Day Away on October 14. I received many compliments from our visitors on our welcoming spirit and overall enjoyable visit.

Reflection

12 Weeks of Franciscan Peace

Evangelical Love. St. Bernard the Abbot stated: "Love is sufficient of itself, it gives pleasure by itself and because of itself. It is its own merit, its own reward. Love looks for no cause outside itself, no effect beyond itself. Its profit lies in its practice.... For when God loves, all he desires is to be loved in return; the sole purpose of his love is to be loved, in the knowledge that those who love him are made happy by their love of him."

Unconditional love, or **agapé**, rooted in behavior toward others without regard to their due is the love with which Jesus loves and speaks; Gospel love: agapé. This is the love that expects nothing from the one loved. It is the love of deliberate choice.

Jesus left us two great Commandments: Love God and love our neighbor as ourselves. So, the greatest commandment is to love. It does seem a little silly to try to command somebody to feel a certain way for someone else. But Jesus is saying that we ought to behave well toward them. I cannot always control how I feel about other people but I am in control of how I behave toward other people.

Saint Francis went about loving the brothers and sisters of Assisi. He greeted each one with "Pace e bene!" "Peace and good!" When you can greet another with the greeting of peace, then you will not have malice in your heart.

Thomas Merton wrote, "The beginning of love is to let those we love be perfectly themselves, and not to twist them to fit our own image. Otherwise we love only the reflection of ourselves we find in them."

Psalm Fragment: "The Lord opens the eyes of the blind; The Lord raises those who are bowed down; The Lord loves the righteous." ~ Psalm 146:8

Reflection Question: How many people have you acknowledged today with a greeting of peace? Will I love as Jesus loves – expecting nothing in return and only wanting the best for the person loved. Journal how this experience affected you.

"I will extol You, my God, O King; And I will bless Your name forever and ever. Every day I will bless You, And I will praise Your name forever and ever. Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; And His greatness is unsearchable." [Psalm 145:1-3]
