

Reflection (Formation Friday)

Why was the TAU Cross so important to St. Francis? Why do we OFS wear the TAU? The TAU, as a symbol of sanctity, comes from Ezekiel 9:4:

"Go through the city of Jerusalem and put a TAU on the foreheads of those who grieve and lament over all the detestable things that are done in it." It is the last letter of the Hebrew alphabet and looks very much like the letter "T".

- Franciscan scholarship points to St. Francis's being present at the Lateran Council in 1215
- While attending he would have heard Pope Innocent III announce that every Catholic should take the TAU Cross as the symbol of their Passover. "The Pope set forth the Tau as a sign of penance and renewal in Christ. Francis embraced this sign as an expression of Christ's cross. In hearing the story, Francis experienced a confirmation of the LIFE and MISSION of his new order. The Tau became for him a symbol of exodus and pilgrimage with which he wanted his companions signed as 'the new and humble people of God.'" He would have heard that the elect, the chosen will be marked with the sign of the TAU (Ezekiel 9:4)
- He would have heard the pope say that the TAU has the form of the Cross on which our Lord was crucified and that those who had mortified their flesh and conformed their life to that of Christ crucified will obtain mercy.
- From then on, the TAU became Francis's own coat of arms and he often used it in his writings as his personal signature.

Why do many Secular Franciscans wear the TAU cross?

- · Article 43 of the General Constitutions establishes that: "The distinctive sign of belonging to the Order (the "TAU" or other Franciscan symbol).
- · Article 16.4 of the National Statutes of the United States states: "The external sign of the OFS in the United States is the TAU.

"The Tau Cross [adapted from Catch Me A Rainbow Too by Fr. Lester Bach, O.F.M. Cap.] Franciscans use the Tau as a symbol of commitment to Jesus through the OFS. Way of Life. The Tau cross is the sign of the OFS in this country, not the San Damiano crucifix, not a medal of St. Francis, not a scapular and cord (such as were mandated under the Rule of 1883), and not a modified religious habit such as friars wear! The Tau is worn with pride and joy. Francis saw the Tau as a symbol of the cross of Christ. It was the sign of salvation. It was a sign of belonging to God, being chosen and saved. Francis embraced it with love. It was pregnant with meaning for him. Franciscans wear it as a sign of their commitment to Jesus and the Gospel way of life."

Servant of God Julia Greeley, O.F.S.

Doris 'Thunder Feather' Allen, OFS



Julia Greeley was born into slavery between 1833 and 1848 in Hannibal, Missouri. She was brutally mistreated by a cruel slave master and was left disabled and blind in one eye. Julia Greeley is the American slave who could become a Saint. After being freed at the end of the Civil War, Julia became a cook and nanny to Julia Dickerson. Later MS. Dickerson married William Gilpin, who had been appointed territorial Governor of Colorado. Julia Greeley moved with the family to Denver, Colorado.

Julia was baptized into the Catholic Church on June 26, 1880 at Sacred Heart Church in Denver. She became devoted to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the Holy Eucharist. Despite having painful arthritis, she walked the streets distributing literature to Catholic and non-Catholics alike.

In 1901, Julia joined the Secular Franciscans and remained an active member for the rest of her life. Greeley spent the majority of her time helping others and completing church duties. For years, Julia was a welcome and familiar sight on Denver's streets. When she appeared, wearing her signature floppy black hat and lugging a little red wagon, it meant she was on her way to bring food, clothing and encouragement to somebody in need. "Old Julia," as she came to be known, did her ministry at night, hobbling on a lame foot, after she had worked all day as a housekeeper, cook and "nanny" to the prominent Gilpin family. She made her rounds after dark so as not to embarrass white families ashamed to accept charity from a poor, black woman. She became known as Denver's Angel of Charity. She also visited Denver Fire Houses and was honored by Denver firefighters on the 100th anniversary of her death.

Greeley died on June 7, 1918 (on the Feast of the Sacred Heart of Jesus) and lay in repose in Loyola Chapel (a first for a layperson in Denver that has not been repeated. She was buried in Mount Olivet Cemetery. A thousand mourners gathered at her funeral, to pay respects to the woman who showed love for the poor.

In January 2014, the Archdiocese of Denver opened an investigation for her sainthood. Her body was moved to Denver's Cathedral Basilica of the Immaculate Conception in 2017. She is the first person to be interred there since in opened in 1912.

Julia is remembered for her great love for neighbor and unselfish devotion to the Christian faith. When serving the poor, Julia never questioned their creed or belief. She wanted to lift up anyone in need. Julia's devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus filled her with love for every human being.

Julia is a role model and inspiration for everyone. Let us go forth like our Secular Franciscan sister, Julia, believing in the intrinsic worth of each individual, no matter what their background, creed or race.

One of the most experienced football coaches in the Blue Water Area has called it a career.

Cardinal Mooney's Joe Quesnelle announced his retirement last Thursday. He spent five seasons with the program and has coached the sport since 1986.

"It just was time," Quesnelle said. "I'm going to be 70 years old next month. It was time. I don't think I'll ever stop what I'm doing. I'll probably find some place that needs some cheap help and volunteer. But not full-time anymore."

The Cardinals went 22-23 during Quesnelle's tenure, which included three playoff appearances. In 2022, they finished 8-3 for the program's best season since 2001. A 48-24 win over Marlette on Oct. 29 was Cardinal Mooney's first postseason win in 11-player football since 2005.

"It's easy working with great kids who come from great families," Quesnelle said. "This year put the icing on the cake. We had our first win ever over (Clarkston) Everest. And then the last time we'd beaten beat (Royal Oak) Shrine was 30 years ago ... a lot of good things happened this year."

In addition to the team's success, senior running back Brendan Haisenleder rushed for a school-record 2,302 yards. That helped the Cardinals reach the Catholic League Prep Bowl for the first time in 21 years. While they ultimately lost to Madison Heights Bishop Foley, 27-13, Quesnelle will never forget their response after halftime.

"One of the things I'm most proud of is the last two years we were academic all-state," Quesnelle said. "Last year we had a 4.0 (grade-point average) for the top 11 players. And this year it was a 3.984."

That holistic approach was first introduced to Quesnelle in 1986, when he interviewed for an assistant coach role at Harper Woods Bishop Gallagher with then-coach George Sahadi.

"We talked for an hour and a half and we never mentioned Xs or Os," Quesnelle said. "But the one thing he said that still stays with me was, 'Joe, our report card isn't complete until 10 years after the kids leave us. What kind of men did we put out?' That's always been in the back of my mind."

After stints at Bishop Gallagher and Eastpointe as an assistant, Quesnelle was the head coach at Detroit Holy Redeemer from 1995-2004. He then served as an assistant with Shrine from 2005-17.

"Nobody wants to win more than I do," Quesnelle said. "But the important thing is, are we creating good men? Looking at the kids from Cardinal Mooney, it was mission accomplished."
