April 29 Regional Gathering Re-Cap

It was good to get together with everyone from the various fraternities. The last time we met in person was before COVID. The Spring Gathering focused on dialogue and our OFS Rules 19 and 8; and Rules 13 and 14. Following are my notes from the Gathering:

- Are we intentional in what we say? The peace of our heart should come out of our mouth.
- We are born with divine seed in us peace is a part of us. Gentleness draws us to peace.
- Is our fraternity conversation meaningful, impactful conversation?

• Always work toward fraternal harmony. In the exchange of ideas and opinions are we listening to body language, person's concerns and feelings.

- Avoid personal certainty, be willing to enter a conversation at the beginning not at the end.
- Don't try to change minds, try to understand each other's position.
- Be curious unpack your own feelings; be open and available; be cautious in ascribing motives
- Assume the best of the other person and that they are coming from the best place they have.
- Trusting in the divine presence in everyone and in the transforming power of love and pardon.
- Try to be a messenger of perfect joy in every circumstance; Strive to bring joy and hope to others.
- Perfect Joy perfectly humble even if being cast aside.
- Not to engage in arguments, but to be subject to God's creature for God's sake.
- "You can disagree without being disagreeable" Ruth Bader Ginsburg
- Fraternity commonalities: Common Bond Faith, Love for Francis and Clare and Love of Fraternity.
- Important to have humility and listen respectfully.
- We each bring our own gifts to good of fraternity, church and world.
- "Start by doing what's necessary then do what's possible and suddenly your doing the impossible."

Brittney Walendzik gave two presentations. One on Francis and the Sultan and the other on "How to do an elevator pitch?" Both were excellent. What's an elevator pitch your ask? Well, it's like giving a 45 second infomercial. What would you say in 45 seconds to somebody who didn't know anything about being a Secular Franciscan? REFLECTION - May the Month of Mary

A Salutation of the Virtues (Francis of Assisi "The Saint" Early Documents)

As suggested in the introduction to A Salutation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the manuscript tradition suggests that Francis saw these virtues as hers; yet they are clearly those of any Christian who has died to sin. Francis greets each virtue in a fashion typical of a medieval troubadour, describes the predisposition which each Christian must have before possessing them, and concludes by interpreting the function of each.

¹Hail, Queen Wisdom!^b May the Lord protect You, with Your Sister, holy pure Simplicity! ²Lady holy Poverty, may the Lord protect You, with Your Sister, holy Humility! ³Lady holy Charity, may the Lord protect You, with Your Sister, holy Obedience. ⁴Most holy Virtues, may the Lord protect all of You from Whom You come and proceed. ⁵There is surely no one in the whole world who can possess any one of You without dying first. ⁶Whoever possesses one and does not offend the others possesses all. ⁷Whoever offends one ^{Jas 2:10} does not possess any and offends all.c ⁸And each one confounds vice and sin.

⁹Holy Wisdom confounds Satan and all his cunning. ¹⁰**Pure holy Simplicity** confounds all the wisdom of this world ^{1 Cor 2:6} and the wisdom of the body. ¹¹Holy Poverty confounds the desire for riches, greed. and the cares of this world. ¹²Holy Humility confounds pride, all people who are in the world and all that is in the world.a ¹³Holy Charity confounds every diabolical and carnal temptation and every carnal *fear*. ^{1 Jn 4:18} ¹⁴Holy Obedience confounds every corporal and carnal wish, ¹⁵binds its mortified body to obedience of the Spirit and obedience to one's brother, ¹⁶so that it is subject and submissive to everyone in the world, ¹⁷not only to people but to every beast and wild animal as well ¹⁸that they may do whatever they want with it insofar as it has been given to them *from above* ^{Jn 19:11} by the Lord.

Principles of Dialogue

- We should recognize that no single group or viewpoint in the church has a complete monopoly on the truth. While the bishops united with the Pope have been specially endowed by God with the power to preserve the true faith, they too exercise their office by taking counsel with one another and with the experience of the whole church, past and present. Sclutions to the church's problems will almost inevitably emerge from a variety of sources.
- We should not envision ourselves or any one part of the church a saving remnant. No group within the church should judge itself alone to be possessed of enlightenment or spurn the Catholic community, its leaders, or its institutions as unfaithful.
- We should test all proposals for their pastoral realism and potential impact on individuals as well as for their theological truth. Pastoral effectiveness is a responsibility of leadership.
- 4. We should presume that those with whom we differ are acting in good faith. They deserve civility, charity, and a good-faith effort to understand their concerns. We should not substitute labels, abstractions, or blanketing terms—"radical feminism," "the hierarchy," "the Vatican"—for living, complicated realities.
- 5. We should put the best possible construction on differing positions, addressing their strongest points rather than seizing upon the most vulnerable aspects in order to discredit them. We should detect the valid insights and legitimate worries that may underlie even questionable arguments.
- 6. We should be cautious in ascribing motives. We should not impugn another's love of the church and loyalty to it. We should not rush to interpret disagreements as conflicts of starkly opposing principles rather than as differences in degree or in prudential pastoral judgments about the relevant facts.
- We should bring the church to engage the realities of contemporary culture, not by simple defiance or by naive acquiescence, but acknowledging, in the fashion of *Gaudium et Spes*, both our culture's valid achievements and real dangers.
